



# THE COLD WAR – PROXY WARS

## POSSIBLE ESSENTIAL QUESTIONS

- How did proxy wars, rooted in Cold War global politics, inadvertently impact nations and individuals around the globe during the Cold War era and in present day?

## BACKGROUND

In the aftermath of World War II, and the use of the atomic bomb in Hiroshima and Nagasaki Japan, rising superpowers such as the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics (USSR) and the United States of America (USA) sought to lay claim and develop alliances with nations across the globe in order to promote their political ideologies and avoid atomic warfare.

Through the implementation of the Marshall Plan, the USA sought to aid in rebuilding Western Europe, to establish democracy and to prevent the spread of communism from 1948 to 1952. The USSR opposed the Marshall Plan as they feared it would create an anti-Soviet bloc.

The USSR, in turn, took advantage of their international political power to subversively influence the spread of communism by encouraging and backing uprisings and civil wars.

With both super powers vying for power and working to promote opposing political agendas, a series of armed conflicts erupted across the globe. These conflicts acted as Proxy Wars in which the USA and the USSR could actively utilize resources to back allies without officially engaging in armed conflict. With nuclear capabilities such as intercontinental ballistic missiles (ICBMs), whose range made it possible to fire and strike across the Atlantic, the USA and USSR feared mutually assured destruction (MAD), or the idea that each power might annihilate one another nearly simultaneously. Fear of MAD stabilized the relationship between the USA and USSR, allowing for détente, or reconciliation, from the mid-1960s to 1980.

These proxy wars had a tremendous impact on the development of numerous nations, the political landscape of the world, and daily lives of individuals in impacted regions.
